AUA-USICA Presentation of Dr. George Bozzini

During the first three weeks of August, AUA and USICA presented a series of special seminars for Ministry of Education and University English teaching specialists. The seminars were conducted by Dr. George Bozzini, Director of the English Program for International Students at George Washington University.

Sessions were held at AUA and at Mahidol University in Bangkok; in Sri Nakarin Wirote University in Pitsanulok; in Payap College and Chiang Mai University in Chiang Mai; in Prince of Songkhla University in Pattani and Haad Yai; and in Khon Kaen University. Subjects of the seminars included issues in the teaching of English as a foreign language, English for special purposes, different approaches to curriculum design, devising tests based on student needs, the teaching of writing, and adapting materials to achieve communicative competence. Dr. Maurice Frankel and Dr. Patamaka Sukontamarn participated with Dr. Bozzini in one panel discussion on the relative merits and deficiencies of the Structural, Situational, and Notional/Functional approaches to curriculum design.
